SAFETY JEOPARDY

Instructions

1. Paste both the Safety Jeopardy category board and number sheet on light card.
2. Cut up the number cards until there are 20 separate cards – cut on the inside lines so the number cards are a bit smaller than the boxes on the Safety Jeopardy category board.
3. Use Velcro or Blu tac to stick the number cards randomly onto the Safety Jeopardy category board.
4. Print the Safety Jeopardy questions and answers.
5. Divide the class into teams.
6. Select a quiz master or the Teacher is the quiz master.

Rules

- Teams take it in turns to pick a number
- Lift card and reveal category - put the number aside so it cannot be picked again
- Select category question
 - correct answer, a point is awarded
 - incorrect answer, next team answers and if correct they get the point
- **Jeopardy** - If Jeopardy is revealed, the team can agree to go for double the point if they win, but will lose double the point if they answer incorrectly – OR the team can agree not to play for an extra point.
- Continue until time is up or all the categories have been revealed.
- Add up team point totals.

SAFETY JEOPARDY QUESTIONS

The Correct answers are green. The first questions in each category are a little easier.

Jeopardy

1. If someone is hurt badly and an ambulance is needed, what is the emergency number to call?

2. Planet ThinkSafe is a website safety program for mums and dads
True **False**
3. When it is very hot in summer there is less risk of sunburn if you:
a) wear a hat and sunscreen
b) stay in the shade if you can
c) both
4. Planet ThinkSafe tells kids how to use the ThinkSafe SAM steps to help stop people getting hurt:
a) at school and at work
b) at home, at school and on the road
5. What three services do you call the emergency number for?
Police, fire and ambulance
6. If someone you don't know or trust approaches you what do you do? (Just one answer is OK)
 - **Run away – yell out loudly if they try to stop you**
 - **Always say no to lollies, money, rides and games**
 - **Find a safe house or shop**
 - **Tell an adult about it**
7. SAM is playing football with his mates and the ball has gone on the road, what should SAM do?
 - **Stop look, listen and think before going to get it.**
 - **If it is a very busy road it may be too dangerous to try to get it.**

SAM questions

1. What colour is ThinkSafe SAM?

Yellow or gold

2. What does SAM do to protect himself when riding a skateboard?

Wears a helmet, shin guards, kneepads

3. ThinkSafe SAM teaches kids when to look out for hazards and what to do.

4. What does ThinkSafe SAM's name stand for?

Spot the hazard, Assess the risk and Make the changes

5. The second ThinkSafe SAM step is "Assess the risk".

6. What does make the changes mean?

Fixing the hazard if you can or telling an adult about it.

7. What does spot the hazard means?

Looking out for dangerous things that could hurt you or someone else.

8. What does assess the risk mean?

Working out how likely it is a hazard will hurt someone and how badly they will be hurt.

School questions

1. Why do we have safety rules at school?
To help stop kids getting hurt
2. There's some glass in the grass. What should you do?
Don't pick it up – tell an adult.
3. The teacher is picking teams and asks you to line up. If you push in, what might happen?
Someone could fall over and get hurt.
4. The best way to avoid slipping on wet grass at school is to:
 - a) take your shoes off
 - b) walk, don't run**
 - c) wear rubber soled tough shoes
5. School bags and things left on the floor are an electrical hazard

6. At school there is a risk of kids getting eye injuries or cut or stabbed from:

Road questions

1. What should you wear on your head when riding your bike?
A bike helmet.
2. When crossing roads, kids should:

3. What is the first thing you should do when you get into the car?
Put on your seatbelt and make sure it goes across your chest and over your shoulder
4. Why should you wear a seatbelt in a car when mum or dad drives you somewhere?
To stop you being thrown around the car if the car stops suddenly or crashes.
5. Where is the safest place to cross a road?
At traffic lights, crosswalk or school crossing
6. When travelling in cars, kids should always:

 - c) sit on a cushion so they can see
7. To lessen the risk of being hurt, kids going to school should:
 - a) wear white clothes
